My journey with BSCMS goes back to its early days. A handful of local community influencers came together and established this organisation back in 1998. Soon afterwards I was appointed as Development Manager of the organisation. In that role, I worked closely with the trustees, especially the office-bearers, to develop a strategic vision for the organisation, coupled with a SMART business and operational plan to enable us to address the needs and requirements of the growing minority communities as well as the wider society in Ipswich and Suffolk.

The knowledge and skills that I had acquired during my undergraduate studies, coupled with many years of experience in youth and community work, public transport and retail management, proved to be invaluable during this formative period. Having also been brought up in the north of England, I witnessed first-hand how minority communities became segregated from the wider society in that part of the country, thus leading to considerable social, economic and political difficulties and challenges. Informed by this experience, we pursued a holistic and inclusive vision for the organisation.



It is true that the organisation was initially known as Bangladeshi Support Centre, but from my point of view, this was a historical 'accident' and we needed to transcend the name by adopting a proactive, inclusive and welcoming approach to community development and regeneration. By helping individuals and the growing diverse communities, we made Ipswich and Suffolk a better place for everyone, irrespective of their backgrounds. In the age of 'global village', this was the right thing to do.

In fact, during the last quarter of a century, we worked closely with both statutory and voluntary organisations, as well as other stakeholders, and thereby played a proactive and pivotal role in promoting social harmony, cultural co-existence, educational progress and economic development in a predominantly middle-class and rural English county. Thank you for helping us to play such an important role in this beautiful part of the country!



Historical Overview

25 years of BSCMS (1998 - 2023)

Early settlers from the subcontinent came to Ipswich after the Second World War to help rebuild the country. Many of these young men came from East Bengal but after the partition of India in 1947, it became known as East Pakistan. They lived in central Ipswich, working in local factories and the dockyard, and earned enough to survive and send some money back to their families.

Subsequently, they purchased their own homes with the intention of bringing their families from the subcontinent to settle permanently in Ipswich. As more and more families moved to Ipswich, the community gradually expanded, so much so that by the early 1980s the need for a permanent place for religious and cultural activities became a priority for the community leaders.

Whilst the establishment of Ipswich Mosque in the mid-1980s met the community's religious and spiritual needs, there was a gap in the social, educational, cultural and health-related activities. This prompted a group of committed volunteers from the community to set up a charity to cater for the diverse needs of the growing Black Minority Ethnic (BME) people in Ipswich and Suffolk. BSC Multicultural Services (BSCMS), previously known as Bangladeshi Support Centre (BSC), started operating in 1998 from two premises belonging to Ipswich and Shahjalal mosques. In 2000, it relocated to 19 Tower Street (Ipswich) which housed many other voluntary sector organisations including the Ipswich Citizens Advice Bureau.

Founder members of BSCMS included late Azizur Rahman (businessman and one of the founders of Ipswich Mosque), Syed Junab Robbani (businessman and one of the founders of Shahjalal Mosque), AKM Mahbubul Alam (former local government officer), Boshor Ali (businessman), Mahbub Alam Shamim (businessman), Moshud Ali (businessman) and late Jill Stewart (local government officer). Others who served on the management committee over the years included Abdul Momin Khan (Liton), Mohammed Moksood Ali, Sajjad Miah, Monwara Ali, Kohinoor Begum, Fotik Miah, Ian Burnett and Adrian Barney. The aims and objectives of the organisation were:

- To support people of BME communities in Ipswich and Suffolk, and engage them in social, cultural, educational and recreational activities by:
 - Advancing education and training
 - Empowering individuals and communities
 - Providing information, help and support in a culturally sensitive environment

BSCMS started with a grant of £250 from Suffolk County Council (SCC) and thereafter received other small amounts of funding from both SCC and Ipswich Borough Council. This enabled BSCMS to appoint a part-time Advice Officer, who provided information, advice and guidance to its clients in the form of a drop-in service.

Once BSCMS had secured sufficient funding, it was able to appoint a part-time Development Manager. The manager worked closely with the trustees (especially the office-bearers) to prepare both business and operational plans for the expansion of the organisation. Applications were submitted for additional funding from local, regional and national sources.

As the demand for BSCMS services increased and more funding was secured from a range of sources, the charity grew and expanded its services considerably. To meet the demand, more staff (both part-time and full-time) were recruited to deliver new projects and services. During the last 25 years, BSCMS planned and delivered many

innovative and transformative projects in order to empower, upskill and integrate Ipswich and Suffolk's BME people into the wider society (see section 7 for more details). Though BSCMS's journey over the last two and a half decades was not a plain sail, however the commitment, loyalty and dedication shown by its trustees, staff and volunteers enabled BSCMS to face all the challenges and difficulties with strength and fortitude. In recognition of its outstanding contribution and achievements. BSCMS received more than a dozen awards from local, regional and national organisations, both statutory and voluntary.

Projects at a glance

Support Services Drop-in

The purpose of this project was to provide one-to-one guidance and support to disadvantaged and vulnerable people in Ipswich and Suffolk. The office was opened for a few hours a week but through word-of-mouth the number of people seeking help and support steadily increased. Once additional funding was secured, BSCMS's office hours were increased to 2 days a week. A few years later, this was increased to 3 days a week to meet the growing demand.

As more and more ethnic minority people moved to Ipswich, BSCMS naturally became the first point of contact for many growing Kurdish, Turkish, South Indian, African and Eastern European people. As a result, the number of people coming to BSCMS for help continued to increase and office was opened 4/5 days a week. Our Advice Officer's dealt with around 2000 cases annually with people of more than 50 different nationalities benefitting. In total, we have handled around 50,000 cases since BSCMS was established.





Befriending Scheme

This project was established in 2003 in partnership with Suffolk County Council to provide support to some of Suffolk's most disadvantaged and vulnerable BME elderly people to enable them to lead healthy and independent lives for as long as possible. Since its inception, the project regularly engaged elderly people in a range of activities (such as chair-based exercise, healthy walks in the park, winter health awareness events, etc) which the participants really valued and appreciated, not least because many of them experienced multiple barriers including language, cultural, gender and health problems.

In addition, the part-time Project Co-ordinators (male and female) made regular home visits to support the clients who could not visit our office due to disability or related issues. We had more than 100 clients on our contact list and Suffolk County Council's subsequent decision to cut funding for this project hampered our efforts, but the Lottery Community Fund deserves credit for sustaining this project for the benefit of our older client group.





Supplementary School

BSCMS Supplementary School was established in 2014 with the support of Lloyds TSB Foundation and Suffolk County Council. Currently it works with young people of more than 30 different nationalities who not only experience educational and economic disadvantage but also face social, cultural and language barriers. This project offers the following services:

- 1) 'Saturday School' and 'Homework Club' provides disadvantaged young people additional support in English, Maths and Science (led by qualified teachers, assistant tutors and volunteers). This helps children to improve their knowledge of core subjects, complete homework on time and thereby tackle academic underperformance at school.
- 2) 'Sports Days' enables young people to engage in recreational activities (eg, football, badminton, table tennis, fitness). Prior to this project, children spent their leisure time playing games on electronic devices or hanging around street corners. Now more than 200 young people and their families participate in constructive activities, tackling social isolation, promoting social integration and reducing incidents of anti-social behaviour.
- 3) This project has improved family relationship through parent-child activities (eg, boxing with dad, zumba with mum, various workshops, etc), thus encouraging parents and children to work as a team. Children and their parents also attend educational trips, trainings and outings organised by this project.

Funded by BBC Children in Need and supported by Northgate High School, St Helens Primary School, Goals Sports Centre, Ipswich Tigers, Suffolk County Council, Community Action Suffolk, Active Suffolk and Inspire Suffolk, among others, this project has transformed the lives of hundreds of children and their families for the better.



BME Social Prescribing Service

This service was established several years ago in partnership with NHS Suffolk and North East Essex Integrated Care Board (SNEE ICB) to support clients with non-medical issues (such as social, financial, employment and family problems) that are having a detrimental impact on their health and wellbeing. Through referrals from GP surgeries, health service providers as well as other stakeholders, we have been able to help hundreds of clients. The cases have been more complex and challenging, often requiring ongoing work with clients to address their issues.

Led by a part-time Social Prescribing Service Manager and assisted by two part-time Social Prescribers, this service has also organised outreach events in Ipswich and Suffolk Coastal to raise awareness within the BME communities in rural locations.





Training Project

This project was established soon after the inauguration of BSCMS in 1998. Trustees, staff and volunteers of BSCMS were aware that there was an urgent need to organise a range of capacity building trainings and workshops in order to upskill BME people who were at the time working mainly in catering (restaurants and takeaways), retail (shops and markets) and manufacturing (local factories). One of the highlights was the GET IT ON Project which, although funded by European Social Fund and Learning and Skills Council, was delivered by BSCMS in partnership with several other organisations. This enabled BSCMS to set-up an IT Training Suite to deliver in-house trainings (basic, intermediate and advance levels). Other trainings and workshops delivered under the umbrella of this project included:

- ESOL Classes (for men and women)
- Basic IT and Internet
- Level 2 Food Hygiene Course
- Advance Food Hygiene Course
- Health and Safety Training
- Risk Assessment Training
- First Aid for Workplace
- Safeguarding Training
- Employability Training (CV Writing and Interview Techniques)
- Sewing Class for BME Women
- Taster Cooking Sessions
- Basic Motor Vehicle Maintenance
- Introduction to Plastering and Decorating
- Online Safety Training
- Mental Health Workshops
- BME Women's Health Seminars
- Winter Health Awareness Events

Thousands of people from across Suffolk have benefited from the training project including men, women, children and those with special learning needs.

Carers Project

This project was set up in partnership with Ipswich Borough Council to identify and support BME carers and their families. This one-year pilot enabled BSCMS to identify more than 30 BME carers and cared for in Ipswich, which subsequently enabled us to develop this project with further funding from Suffolk County Council via Suffolk Community Foundation. As a result, we were able to identify and support nearly 100 BME carers and cared for over the years including outreaching into Lowestoft, Bury St Edmunds, Newmarket, Sudbury and Suffolk Coastal.

The carers and their families really valued the respite breaks organised by this project including Healthy Walks in the Park, Pamper Days, Outings and Community Engagement Events aimed at carers and their families. We have also referred clients to Suffolk Family Carers for assessment and further support.





Health Awareness and Prevention Project

This project was developed in partnership with NHS Suffolk, SCC Public Health and National Social Marketing Centre (London) to raise awareness of health issues in the BME communities in Suffolk (especially Bangladeshi people). Through a series of health events, we highlighted issues that affected BME people focusing on preventing heart disease, diabetics, gastric and blood pressure. Hundreds of people attended the events and provided positive feedback.

This project was such a success that NHS England considered it as 1 of the 3 most interesting and innovative initiatives in the whole country. BSCMS was invited to London for the launch of the brochure which provided a detailed overview of our project. NSMC also featured our project in their 'Lighting the Beacon' booklet which was distributed nationally, thus providing more recognition for BSCMS. Then, towards the end of 2018, we linked up with Ipswich and East Suffolk CCG to continue this work and reinforce the message of health and wellbeing within the BME communities in Suffolk. This work has continued with closer partnership and collaboration with SNEE Integrated Care Board.





Tenant's Support Project

This project is a partnership between BSCMS and Ipswich Borough Council to provide direct support to IBC's BME tenants to reduce rent arrears, sort out repairs, deal with housing benefit and other related issues.

It was established more than 15 years ago and the Tenant's Support Officer has continued to work with this client group. There are currently more than 100 clients on our database and our staff, based at Grafton House, works closely with IBC officers and other relevant stakeholders to resolve housing related queries and questions.

BME Women's Project

This project was set up in 2002 with the intention of proactively engaging socially isolated BME women in educational, social and cultural activities to empower them to become more assertive, independent and proactive members of our society. Thanks to funding from Co-op, Lloyds TSB Foundation and the local authorities, we employed a part-time Women's Engagement Officer to outreach into the BME communities and engage women in a range of activities (such as Basic IT, Sewing Classes, Employability Skills and Educational Trips).

The project became really successful with more than 200 BME women on its contact list and over the 10 years of this project we supported hundreds of women in Ipswich and across Suffolk.





Curry and Culture Heritage Project

Funded by Lottery Heritage Fund and working in partnership with Ipswich Museum, Suffolk Record Office (now The Hold) and Northgate High School, this 3-year project collected information (both oral and written), photos and related memorabilia from the early Bengali settlers in Ipswich to record and preserve their stories of migration, settlement and contribution. Two part-time Project Co-ordinators interviewed more than 30 early settlers and their colleagues (both men and women). In so doing, they produced dozens of detailed and informative profiles.

The information collected through this project enabled BSCMS to produce a mobile exhibition along with photos, arts and artefacts, and we produced three educational brochures for use in citizenship, history and religious studies classes at local primary and secondary schools.


The end of the project was celebrated at Endeavour House, headquarters of Suffolk County Council, with more than 300 people of diverse background attending including many prominent guests and dignitaries. Since then, the mobile exhibition has been hosted by Ipswich Borough Council, Suffolk New College, Ipswich Museum, University of Suffolk, Kirklees Centre (Lowestoft) and BICO in Bury St Edmunds, among others. More than 10,000 people have benefitted from this project.

Sporting Citizenship

BSCMS worked on this unique one-year pilot project in partnership with Inspire Suffolk to engage young men of Asian and Eastern European background from the Norwich Road area in a series of sporting and citizenship activities to raise cultural awareness and promote social integration.

Funded by Suffolk Police and Crime Commissioner, this project organised weekly sporting activities which attracted young men from 20 different nationalities. Learning and cultural awareness was raised through citizenship sessions, which were embedded into the recreational sessions (eg, football, badminton) to promote a sense of belonging and commonality, irrespective of background. This project took place from 2016 to 2017 and more than 100 young men benefitted from it.





Euro 2020 Legacy Project

This project was funded by Sports England and it was delivered in partnership with Suffolk FA. Like the Sporting Citizenship Project, it offered free football sessions to BME people to encourage them to stay fit, active and healthy. The weekly sessions took place at Suffolk New College Sports Centre on Sundays and more than 100 people of diverse backgrounds benefited.

The end of project was celebrated with a Community Cup in collaboration with Suffolk FA and many other stakeholders. Trophies were handed over to the winners by the Mayor of Ipswich.

Seeds for Change

This project was funded by local councils and other stakeholders to engage young men, especially from the Norwich Road area of Ipswich, in sporting and related constructive activities. We worked closely with Suffolk FA and our sessional workers engaged young men of many different nationalities to come together and play football at the Goals Sport Centre in Ipswich.

Overseen by a part-time project manager, the work was proactively promoted in Ipswich and the response has been overwhelming as hundreds of young men have benefited from this project since its launch after the Covid-19 pandemic.

Suffolk-wide Community Engagement Events


Although based in Ipswich, BSCMS is a Suffolk-wide organisation and over the last 25 years we proactively engaged with communities across the county to raise awareness of health and wellbeing, and promote social and cultural understanding especially in Newmarket, Bury St Edmunds, Woodbridge, Felixstowe, Brandon, Lowestoft and Sudbury.

During 2015 to 2017 alone, BSCMS worked with Waveney Bangladeshi Forum, Kirklees Centre in Lowestoft, Brandon International School, West Suffolk BME Women's Group, BICO in Bury St Edmunds and Waveney District Council, among others, to organise a series of Community Engagement Events across Suffolk which attracted hundreds of people of different backgrounds.

This was replicated in Ipswich during 2017 and, as a result, BSCMS organised three Community Engagements Events in partnership with Ipswich Borough Council. Again, the events attracted people of diverse backgrounds and it provided an opportunity for local people to highlight and discuss issues of concern to them and their neighbours with their local councillors and other officials.

Barriers to Learning and Employment for BME Communities (Research)

This was a one-year research project funded by the Learning and Skills Council. BSCMS explored and highlighted barriers to learning and employment within the BME communities in Suffolk. Using a range of research methods (including interviews, questionnaires and outreach visits to community centres), BSCMS collected information about the challenges and difficulties faced by ethnic minority people in Suffolk, especially those who had special needs, disabilities or did not speak English fluently. This research paper made several recommendations for the benefit of local service providers, both statutory and voluntary.





Annual Educational Awards

To inspire young people to achieve their full potential in life, BSCMS incorporated this event into the Annual Global Food and Pita Festival, which attracts around 1000 people at Suffolk New College. Now in its 12th year, this award recognises young people, both male and female, for their exceptional performance in GCSEs, A-levels, undergraduate and postgraduate degrees or related fields (eg, sports). Recognising high-achievers within the BME communities inspires others to aim high and pursue their dreams for the benefit of everyone. Up to 30 children and young adults are publically recognised each year.



Annual Educational Trips and Outings

BSCMS projects and activities seek to break-down barriers, promote understanding and encourage positive engagement with the wider society. To achieve this, right from the outset, BSCMS organised annual trips and outings for socially isolated and marginalised members of society to become productive members. These trips and outings are aimed at young people, adults and elderly people, both male and female, and they are open to people of all backgrounds.



Hate Crime Awareness Project

Working in partnership with Suffolk Police and Crime Commissioner and Community Action Suffolk, this one-year project raised awareness of hate crime within the BME communities in Suffolk.

Through workshops, trainings and proactive outreach, BSCMS empowered ethnic minority people of diverse background to take hate crime more seriously and report such incidents to police or other appropriate authorities.

More than 200 people benefited from this project, especially taxi drivers, shopkeepers and catering staff, and our work also led to Suffolk Constabulary appointing a Hate Crime Officer. A report was subsequently compiled and shared with Suffolk Community Foundation.



Online Safety Training for BME Communities

Aimed at children, young people and their families, this project raised awareness of the risks or dangers of using the internet, thus offering tips on how to stay safe online using safety tools and parental control. Training sessions were delivered at BSCMS Supplementary School, Homework Club, and other suitable venues in Ipswich and across Suffolk. More than 300 people benefited from this work.



Healthwatch Suffolk Consultation with BME Communities

Working in partnership with Healthwatch Suffolk, BSCMS consulted nearly 200 BME people from Ipswich and Suffolk Coastal regarding the quality of local health and social services. This took place through 1) a series of consultation events and 2) a questionnaire. More than 150 people attended the consultations and more than 100 people completed the questionnaire. Based on participants' verbal and written feedback, BSCMS compiled a detailed report for Healthwatch Suffolk incorporating recommendations for further improvement.



Diversity Training for Service Providers

Since its inception, BSCMS played a proactive role in raising awareness of cultural diversity in Ipswich and Suffolk. BSCMS believes in only one race, namely the human race. Therefore, colour, language, faith, gender and background enrich our common humanity. Such an integrated approach to human commonality enabled BSCMS to plan and deliver Diversity trainings and workshops for the benefit of people working in the statutory and voluntary organisations in Suffolk.

BSCMS's Diversity trainings are unique because they are based on our learning and experience acquired over quarter of a century. Local doctors, nurses, social workers, police officers, teachers, council staff and elected officials, amongst others, who participate in BSCMS's practical and problem-solving approach find it more interesting than a largely theoretical view detached from the realities of life.



Supporting Good Causes

As a charity and grassroots-based organisation, BSCMS believes in supporting good causes, both locally and nationally. Over the last 25 years, we organised fundraising activities in support of BBC Children in Need, St. Elizabeth Hospice, Ipswich Soup Kitchen, Orwell Challenge and even victims of flooding and other natural disasters in Bangladesh. Thousands of pounds were raised to help such good causes, thanks to the commitment and dedication of our Management Committee members, staff, volunteers, clients and well-wishers.



Sporting and Recreational Activities

BSCMS has played an active role in promoting sports and recreational activities in our communities during the last 25 years. This was underpinned by our desire to encourage people to lead a healthy lifestyle but not at the expense of fun and enjoyment. Thus, we have encouraged hundreds, if not thousands of local BME people to become physically active and healthier.

Working in partnership with local stakeholders (such as Ipswich and East Suffolk CCG, Ipswich Borough Council, Goals Sports Centre, Northgate Sports Centre, Suffolk FA and Ipswich Tigers), we have organised many sports tournaments and recreational activities including:





Covid-19 pandemic was a global crisis. The virus was first identified in China in December 2019 and it soon spread across the world. A month later, the World Health Organisation declared a public health emergency and in March 2020 it was classified as a global pandemic. Like elsewhere, here in the UK, the virus spread quickly and the NHS was on the brink of being overwhelmed. To prevent this, the whole country went into lockdown on 23 March 2020 and for over a year a series of measures were put in place by the government to protect lives and livelihoods.

During this period of unprecedented crisis, BSCMS showed its true colours. As the emergency services (paramedics, ambulance service, hospitals) struggled to cope, BSCMS prepared and distributed thousands of foods, sanitary and winter packs as well as hardship funds to the vulnerable people in Ipswich and Suffolk. We also provided meals to the homeless in Ipswich. Many people had lost their jobs or had no income (especially the self-employed). Supermarkets also struggled to cope. BSCMS filled the gap by sending food parcels directly to people's homes (prioritising elderly, disabled, lone parents and families with children). BSCMS was also responsible for promoting the vaccination programme within BME communities.

I started working part-time for BSC Multicultural Services in 2004 as a Befriending Project Co-ordinator. I hope this is partly due to my work here at BSCMS which has helped to shape not only BSCMS to what it is today but the community as a whole. In 2018, I was nominated as one of the most inspirational women in Suffolk which was a very proud moment for me and my family.

I would like to take this opportunity to pass on my congratulations to BSCMS on reaching 25 years! From our humble beginnings, we have gone through many good times and many turbulent moments but have managed to hang on when many a great charity had closed their doors.

The Party officially begins when Members of the Royal Family enter the garden at 4pm, when the National Anthem is played by one of the two military bands present.

While the bands continue to play a selection of music, Members of the Royal Family circulate among the guests through 'lanes'. Each takes a different route and random presentations are made so that everyone has an equal chance of speaking to a Member of the Royal Family. Members of the Royal family then arrive at the Royal Tea Tent, where they meet further guests. Guests are free to eat, drink and stroll around the beautiful Palace gardens. Boshor Ali, Chairperson, and Mahbub Alam Shamim, Treasurer, attended the Garden Party at Buckingham Palace on behalf of BSCMS on 3rd May 2023.



The Suffolk Medal

The Suffolk Medal is the highest award that can be made by Suffolk to an individual from Suffolk. The purpose of the Medal is to recognise, reward and champion the exceptional contributions of Suffolk people that have made a fundamental and lasting difference to the county of Suffolk and its people. Recipients come from all areas of county life in the public, private and voluntary sectors, and across all activities of historic and future importance to the county.

Recipients will have gone above and beyond expectations in making a significant individual contribution or made a similar impact on the Suffolk of today. Last year, Boshor Ali, Chair of Board of Trustees of BSCMS, received this award from Lady Clare, Lord-Lieutenant of Suffolk, for his more than two decades of community work in Suffolk.



Reception at 10 Downing Street

A reception was held at Number 10 Downing Street to celebrate the work of Community Champions in constituencies across the UK. Community champions are members of the community who make constituencies a better place to live and work. It was an opportunity to celebrate and thank these champions.

Tom Hunt, MP for Ipswich, welcomed the members of BSC Multicultural Services, Boshor Ali and Mahbub Alam Shamim, to the reception in April 2023. It was hosted by Rt Hon Stuart Andrew MP on behalf of the Prime Minister. The MPs are invited to nominate a local charity champion, with Mr Hunt choosing BSC Multicultural Services. He said, "As an ambassador for BSC Multicultural Services, I've seen close at hand the positive difference the charity makes supporting some of the most vulnerable across the town."



Multicultural Festival

BSCMS never missed an opportunity to highlight and celebrate the diverse cultures and traditions that existed in Ipswich and Suffolk. With more than 60 different languages currently being spoken in Ipswich and more than 120 across Suffolk, this county is very diverse as it is vibrant. Being aware of such diversity, BSCMS became one of the first organisations to plan and organise large community festivals in Ipswich as early as 1998. Three of its major annual events are:

The Annual Community Day moved outdoors in 2000 and became known as 1 BIG Multicultural Festival; it is one of Ipswich and Suffolk's largest and most diverse community festivals with an attendance of over 8000 people of more than 50 different nationalities. Organised in partnership with Ipswich Borough Council and funded by the Arts Council England, other supporters include Suffolk Community Foundation, Belvoir Estate Agents, Staines and Co., PMG Plumbing, Suffolk County Council, Town 102 FM, Ipswich Star, BBC Radio Suffolk and SAI Estates.

Through music, sports and food, this event brings our communities together to celebrate our cultures, diversity and shared values in Alexandra Park, Ipswich. Being one of the largest and most inclusive annual community events in Suffolk, it attracts local, national and international artists including Raxstar, Kanda Bongo Man, Baghdaddies, Rajasthan Heritage Band, Kodjovi Kush and Afrospot All Star, and Samboomba Samba Band. In addition, food from around the world and sports competitions are the key attractions each year including five-a-side football tournament and Kabaddi competition. There is a separate 'health marquee' providing free basic health checks and other preventative services to enable people to stay healthy and active for longer.





Suffolk BME **Business Awards**

This innovative and prestigious event was first planned and delivered in partnership with the University of Suffolk, Ipswich Star and East Anglian Daily Times in 2016. The purpose of this annual event was to raise awareness of the contribution and achievements of BME people to the local economy. With the support of Suffolk Business School, University of Suffolk, BSCMS proactively outreached across Suffolk including Newmarket, Lowestoft, Sudbury, Felixstowe and Ipswich to encourage BME businesses to nominate themselves for the following awards: Business of the Year, Businessperson of the Year, Business of the Year (Catering), Female Entrepreneur of the Year, Start-up or New Business of the Year, Community Business of the Year, Charity of the Year, health Champion of the Year, and Judges' Special Award. Each year, an independent panel of judges scrutinised the nominations and selected the winners.

The awards were sponsored by prominent local businesses and organisations. The award ceremony takes place at the University of Suffolk main auditorium with more than 250 guests attending including prominent businessmen, politicians, faith and community leaders and other dignitaries, in addition to all the shortlisted nominees. As always, the local media provided generous coverage including the Ipswich Star and East Anglian Daily Times. This annual event continues to get bigger and better each year.

Global Food and Pita Festival

Like the Annual Community Day, this festival revolves around a traditional theme. Pitas are sweets and savouries made from flour, sugar, coconut powder and similar ingredients from rural Bangladesh. This festival, held annually at Suffolk New College since 2012, provides both men and women an opportunity to showcase their culinary skills by preparing different types of pitas for a competition. A panel of independent judges select the winners based on taste and design of the entries. Winners are announced on stage and prizes are distributed accordingly. Subsequently it became known as Global Food and Pita Festival, thus being more open and inclusive.

More than 1000 people of diverse background attend this interesting and attractive event every April with visitors coming from as far as London, Norwich, Cambridge, Lowestoft, Luton and Southend-on-Sea. Local businesses and organisations book stalls to promote their products and services at this event.



Orwell Challenge

The Orwell Challenge was first held in 1976 as a healthy challenge in our wonderful Suffolk countryside to raise funds through sponsorship for charities or good causes. In its early days, it was only a walk, and it followed a very similar route, from Ipswich to Felixstowe along the banks of the River Orwell and back, which became the Orwell 25 Walk that we still have today. The Orwell Walk proved an immediate success. In recent years, it has added marathon and half-marathon trail runs to the event, so it really is a day out for all. Now known as The Orwell Challenge, the walk element still remains at the heart of the event.

2023 was the 46th year of the event, and over the years' participants have raised well over £3.2 million for their charities and organisations. BSCMS has been participating in this event for many years raising funds for its projects. This year Tom Hunt, Ipswich MP, joined BSCMS and he walked 10 miles to raise money for its Hardship Fund. The Hardship Fund offers hot meals to homeless people in Ipswich who have fallen on tough times.



Sports Days

Now in its eleventh year, BSCMS Supplementary School has grown over the years and has expanded its activities, helping hundreds of children of diverse backgrounds to achieve their full potential in life. Along with its Saturday School and Homework Club, this project also organises sports days on a regular basis. A variety of sports are on offer including football, table tennis, basketball and badminton, among other things.

The purpose of the sports days is to promote physical activity, encourage healthy lifestyle and keep children and young people busy with useful and constructive activities, thereby reducing community tension and anti-social behaviour. Each sports day attract more than 200 children, young people and their families of diverse backgrounds at the Goals Sports Centre in Ipswich.



Annual Community Day

First held in 1998 at the Wolsey Theatre in Ipswich, this annual event was an in-door celebration of Asian cultures (focusing on Bangladesh) with music, dance, drama and food being the main attraction. With more than 300 people attending, this event was a collaborative effort between several organisations including BSCMS, Ipswich Borough Council, Ipswich Bangladeshi Cultural Group, Wolsey Theatre and Suffolk County Council, amongst others.

One of the highlights of this event was the drama performed by Ipswich Bangladeshi Cultural Group. The drama was based around a theme from rural Bangladesh, which always generated considerable interest in the communities. This event continued to be held at Wolsey Theatre for about 11 years before it moved to a local park.



BSCMS' Impact Through case studies

BSCMS has worked in partnership with both statutory and voluntary organisations in Ipswich and Suffolk to improve local people's quality of life. Our collaboration and co-operation were underpinned by our organisational ethos of maximising output with minimal funding. In so doing, we have had a lasting impact on many people's lives. We achieved this by using our limited resources (human and financial) wisely and also by sharing expertise and reducing duplication through collaboration and synergy. This enabled BSCMS to make a significant contribution to promoting a culture of commonality between people of diverse background over the last 25 years. The following case studies highlight BSCMS's positive impact on people's lives

Case Study - 1



Mr A arrived in the UK as a refugee from the Middle East. He has a wife and 4 young children. He cannot work due to a disability and was facing financial difficulties. As Mr A had 4 young children in the house, they did not a have a TV to keep the children entertained or money to take them out. He also needed bedding, school uniform and winter clothing for the children and was stressed about providing these as well as paying for heating. BSCMS provided Mr A with 2 sets of new bedding, food vouchers and applied for help from the Surviving Winter Funds. BSCMS also secured funding for a television, uniform and winter clothing for the children. This has made a huge difference to the whole family.



Case Study - 2

Mrs D is from Romania and worked various jobs via agencies. She worked with a temporary National Insurance Number and did not apply for pre-settled or settled status. She stopped work in June due to ill health and was not paid SSP as she was on zero-hour contract. Mrs D applied for a NINO in the last few months but the documents were lost in the post. She did not receive a NINO either. BSCMS applied for Universal Credits, but the claim was cancelled. BSCMS applied a second time but she failed her habitual residence test as an interpreter was not provided. Mrs D had no income and her rent was in arrears. BSCMS contacted the landlord and applied for charitable help. She was awarded £400. BSCMS helped her to apply for a new NINO. Also applied for Discretionary Housing Allowance but this was rejected. BSCMS asked for this decision to be reconsidered. Then Mrs D had to leave her flat as it was deemed unsafe by the fire service and the landlord denied her rehousing until she cleared the rent arrears. BSCMS spoke with the parties involved and arranged for accommodation for Mrs D and also provided her food vouchers, bedding and heating for the new flat as well as toiletries.

Case Study - 3

Mr U is of Asian background and had been living with pain and health issues for a number of years. He works long hours, 6 days a week, and often finds it difficult to cope with the stress of work. He became unhappy and very worried, to the extent that his doctor was very concerned.


He attended one of BSCMS's health events and we suggested that he should join our swimming sessions, which he did, and only a few weeks later he felt a lot better and happier. It was as if a huge weight had been lifted from his shoulders. Also, now he feels a lot energetic and has made many new friends.

Case Study - 4

Ms D is a White (English) lone parent of 5 young children. She was experiencing financial difficulties during the COVID crisis and even struggling to feed her children. She came across our organisation via social media and contacted us for urgent help and support. We provided her family will emergency food and winter packs, and this meant that Ms D was able to feed her children during a very challenging and difficult time for her family.

We kept in touch and provided further food packs and a one-off small grant from the Hardship Fund to help them cope during the COVID crisis. The family is very grateful for the help and support they have received so far.





Case Study - 5

Mr and Mrs W are of Caribbean background and both of them are elderly and unwell with multiple health issues including dementia. They live alone and were struggling during the COVID crisis but as soon as their difficulties were brought to our attention, we provided them with regular food packs, winter packs, carers packs and since then we have kept in touch with them to ensure they were safe and well, in addition to offering on-going support through our BME Carers Project as both Mr and Mrs W are vulnerable.

As a result of our intervention, they are now accessing other relevant services and provisions, which they were not aware of, and this has significantly improved their social, financial and health conditions, thus making a real difference to their quality of life for which the couple are most grateful to BSC Multicultural Services, its staff, volunteers and funders alike.

Case Study - 6

Mrs B went into hospital to deliver her baby; however, it was decided by the surgeons that she needed an emergency caesarean. Something went wrong during the procedure that meant Mrs B was bleeding internally afterwards and had to have a further 3 procedures. This left her and her family deeply traumatised and in distress. The family came to BSCMS as they felt the surgeon did not communicate very well and his attitude was poor and indifferent.

BSCMS staff talked with the family and helped them to understand what went on during the entire process and explained that some of the issues they raised were unavoidable due to the emergency nature of the procedure. BSCMS staff helped to calm the family down and also wrote a letter of complaint as requested. Mother and baby subsequently returned home and are doing well. The family members were grateful to BSCMS for the understanding, help and support provided by our staff during such a difficult time for them and their whole family.

Case Study - 7

Mr M and his family, who are of South Indian background, have been running a local off license for many years. The business opens very early in the morning (before 6am) and stays open until the early hours at night. Over the years they had faced many problems with anti-social behaviour, hate crime and racism in general but they had not received any support from either the police or any other agencies. BSCMS visited the business and received detailed feedback from the owner and his colleagues. The family wanted practical support to address and overcome their difficulties and challenges.

We followed-up our earlier consultation with another visit and we offered Mr M and his colleagues a hate crime resource pack consisting of 1) a personal alarm, 2) 'Say No to Hate' crime posters, 3) hate crime reporting card, 4) stress ball and other relevant items. They were delighted to receive the pack and thanked BSCMS for doing something practical to improve their situation. Mr M and his family are now running a successful business without having to face regular incidents of anti-social behaviour, verbal abuse and hate crime.





Case Study - 8

>

Ms Ali was a quiet and shy girl, your average student, lacking confidence and getting by, but she and her friend were encouraged to join BSCMS's Homework Club by their teachers at Northgate High School. Since then, Ms Ali and her friend have made a huge improvement in their academic studies, confidence and health and well-being.

Ms Ali used to be worried and anxious, which she said was stopping her from relaxing and enjoying life to the fullest, however since joining the Homework Club she has been able to relax a lot more, not worried about her school or homework or even chores at home, thanks to help provided by teachers and peers at the Homework Club. Now she is able to cope and manage her workload, having improved her interpersonal skills and self-confidence.

Conclusion

Over the last 25 years, BSCMS rarely discussed or debated multiculturalism in public. Instead, we focused all our attention, efforts and energy to the realisation of multiculturalism in action, aiming at involving people of different origin and background to make Ipswich and Suffolk a better place for everyone to live and work. We believe that cultural knowledge and sensibility provide the basis for ending social isolation and cultural marginalisation, which we endeavoured to achieve by:

- 1. Fostering a culture of commonality and partnership among different ethnic communities,
- 2. Facilitating mutual empowerment through provision of relevant services and activities, valuing diversity and intercultural experiences, and
- 3. Championing health, wellbeing, training and educational upskilling, and participation in sports and recreational activities, both at individual and societal levels.

These actions created more soft-power than we realised, thus contributing to making Ipswich and Suffolk a safe, prosperous and tolerant place for everyone, irrespective of their background. Long may this continue!
